The Challenge

How to use student's strengths to meet their needs.

Step 1: Identify student's strengths, talents, interests.

- * Watch what the student likes doing in his free time.
- * Ask people who know the student what strengths and interests he has.
- * Have a conversation with the student and talk about what he likes.
- * Ask friends of the student what he is good at doing.
- * Have a family meeting and brainstorm a list of the child's gifts.
- * Complete a learning styles or multiple intelligences survey. Click on the links.
